Travel aboard the Rocky Mountaineer from Banff, AB to Vancouver, BC

August 18:

All Aboard!

The journey will begin with a delectable breakfast in the elegant dining room of the bi-level dome car. The wild beauty of the Canadian Rockies will serve as a backdrop for the dining experience onboard the train. The Western Canadian inspired meals are freshly prepared with local ingredients in the moving kitchen by our remarkable onboard chefs.

Travel through the famed Canadian Rockies, crossing the Continental Divide at Kicking Horse Pass. The excitement builds as the train enters the Spiral Tunnels, cuts into Cathedral Mountain and Mount Ogden, before descending through spectacular canyons to the Columbia River valley. Experience the breathtaking beauty of the mountains and canyons of Rogers Pass before entering the five-mile Connaught Tunnel. View the site of the "Last Spike" of the Canadian Pacific Railway and continue along the scenic shores of Shuswap Lake towards your overnight destination, Kamloops.

Castle Mountain

At just over 2,730 m/8,950 feet, this bulky, turreted mountain is an excellent example of castellate type mountains (featuring horizontal rock layers). It was named by Dr. James Hector in 1858 for its obvious castle-like shape.

Spiral Tunnel

In 1907, construction began on the unique Spiral Tunnels, modeled after the tunnel system in Switzerland. It was open in 1909 on the CP Rail Line and is an engineering feat with two tunnels in the form of three-quarter circles in the valley walls. The tunnel is the steepest part of the rail line in North America.

Stoney Creek Bridge

The Stoney Creek Bridge is located on the eastern slopes of Mount Tupper. Its architectural design and beauty made it one of the world's most important bridges of its time. This beautiful bridge spans 147.6 m/484 feet and towers 99 m/325 feet above the creek bed.

Craigellachie

The last spike of the CP Rail line was driven here by Donald Smith, an enthusiastic supporter of the CP Rail, on November 7th, 1885. A cairn now marks the sport of this historic event, which linked Canada by rail from coast to coast.

Hoodoos

Scattered throughout this region, there are unique rock and clay formations called Hoodoos. Hoodoos were formed after the end of the last ice age. As glacial ice retreated, sediment was deposited in the bottom of the glacial lake. When the lake retreated, erosion began and 10,000 years later, the erosion terraces and pillar-like hoodoos are all that remain of the former lakebed.

Welcome to Kamloops, BC!

Kamloops is a historic rail city in central BC with a vibrant community. A city of close to 85,000 people, Kamloops is a major economic hub in British Columbia, attracting a wide variety of events and business opportunities.

August 19:

En route to Vancouver

Your journey continues west along the Thompson River through Canada's desert belt. Pass through the rock sheds of Avalanche Alley and watch out for the two distinct colours of water merging at the meeting of the mighty Thompson and Fraser Rivers. Through the Fraser Canyon marvel at the water's force raging in Hell's Gate, the narrowest point of the Fraser River, before reaching the tranquillity of the Fraser Valley's rich farmlands. Nestled between the Pacific Ocean and the Coast Mountains is Vancouver, your final destination.

Ashcroft

Ashcroft is one of the driest places in Canada with less than 25.4 cm/1 inches of annual rainfall. Clement Cornwall and his brother Henry came to BC in 1862 and established a ranch here called Ashcroft Manor, named after their family home in England. Clement Cornwall became one of the province's first senators after Confederation with Canada in 1871 and the LT. Governor of BC for six years commencing in 1881. Today, Ashcroft is a large cattle ranching are.

Avalanche Alley

Rock sheds and slide detection fences protect the CN Rail track from unstable areas above. Alongside, we see a number of old telegraph poles, which were once used to communicate with the train.

Hell's Gate

The Canyon's most popular and renowned tourist attraction is Hell's Gate, the narrowest part of the Fraser River. As much as 909,218,000 litres/ 200 million gallons of water pound and surge each minute through a 33.53 m/110 foot wide gorge. The height of the Fraser can vary as much as 24.38/80 feet throughout the year at this point. It was named by Simon Fraser in 1808 because it reminded him of the "Gates of Hell." Many visitors take in the excitement of Hell's Gate by riding the Swiss built, AirTram, which ascends 152.4 m/500 feet to the opposite side of the gorge.
